World Peace Flame

Thank you Lord Mayor and thank you Concord for all that you do and for hosting this service every year. It is our pleasure to be here once again with the World Peace Flame

When the World Peace Flame was created in 1999 the dream was as simple as it is ambitious—one flame uniting people worldwide. I believe the World Peace Flame represents the light and peace which resides in each one of us.

We are delighted that Garforth Leeds became the first town in England last year to install England's first World Peace Flame monument. The project is a community project and I am very pleased to say Garforth is happily embracing this flame of peace.

We continue to have amazing support from our Garforth in Bloom group, our local councillors and our schools and local people. We have been welcomed in all five of our primary schools and now into the high school with the message of peace and the power of this amazing flame by presenting peace assemblies. We have given out over 3000 World Peace Flame candles to the children with the simple message that we can all be the peace we wish to see in the world.

We are also aiming to work with schools on an ongoing basis with different peace projects. Many of the schools are inspired with the idea of a peace wall, peace corner and of their own peace garden and peace pathway like the one in the Hague. This is outside the Peace Palace alongside the World Peace Flame monument and the pathway was created in 2004 with stones of significance from all countries of the world. The schools like the idea of creating their own and bonding in peace with schools around the

world although it could be a very lengthy project!

We are also delighted to say our Garforth schools will be part of the first Garforth annual peace lantern walk. This will take place on the 8th of November and will involve the children making their own peace lantern and walking to the Garforth Peace Flame and reflecting on peace and a dedication for Armistice Day and the hundredth anniversary of the end of world War one in peace.

York Minster has the World Peace Flame on display for the whole of this year as a symbol of peace for this same anniversary. Also in November the Royal Armouries in Leeds will display, for the eighth year in succession, this amazing flame of peace again reflecting upon peace and Armistice Day.

Our two local villages, Scholes and Barwick in Elmet, are also in the process of creating their own WPF monuments too.

I believe gatherings such as this, where we can all honour and respect each other and each other's beliefs in peace add to the peace in the world, so thank you all.

I invite you all to take several World Peace Flame candles away with you today even if you have taken one previously, and pass these on to friends, family, colleagues, anyone who may be troubled and in need of peace. Each candle is lit from this precious flame of peace and every candle it lies becomes another world peace flame, thus passing it on.
